

Glossary of Terms for Student Analytics Reports

21st Century Scholar

21st Century Scholar indicator of whether the student was historically associated with the 21st Scholars program. Note that this does not indicate if a student is receiving a 21st Century Scholars Grant. 21st Century Award Recipient

21st Century Award Recipient indicator of whether the student was historically associated with the 21st Scholars program. This includes only students receiving a 21st Century Scholars State Grant. Academic Year

Academic Year - includes fall, spring, and the following summer semesters. For example, AY 13-14 would be Fall 2013, Spring 2014, Summer I 2014, and Summer II 2014

Academic years includes fall, winter, spring, and both summer semesters. For example, AY 13-14 would be Fall 2013, Spring 2014, Summer I 2014, and Summer II 2014

Administrative Tracking Group

Administrative Tracking Group – various non-degree programs and degree-seeking programs in which the degree is not affiliated with IU

Age

Age - the students age at census of the indicated term

Area Certificate

Area Certificate – Certificates awarded only in combination with an undergraduate degree. Area certificates do not exist at the graduate level. See http://registrar.iupui.edu/chairs/degrees/Area_to_a_Stand-Alone_Certificate.pdf.

BA (Intended Degree)

BA (Intended Degree) – Bachelor’s Degree

Bachelor’s Degree Holder

Bachelor’s Degree Holder – is an undergraduate student who has enrolled as a new undergraduate pursuing an undergraduate degree who already has already earned a bachelor’s degree

Campus housing

Campus housing – Students indicated as living in campus housing had paid a student residence fee to IUPUI in their first fall semester.

Career

Career – this refers to the level of the degree the student intends to earn. This could refer to undergraduate, graduate, or professional degrees.

Career – this refers to the level of the degree the student intends to earn. This includes undergraduate, graduate and professional careers.

Census

Census - The census day is one week after the start of classes for a given term.

Continuing Students

Continuing Students – Indicates that a student is enrolled on any IU campus at census of the indicated term and had not received a degree or certificate in that academic career.

Course Level

Course Level - GRAD indicates courses at the graduate level, including Medicine, Law, Dentistry, and Graduate research and academic and research (Masters and PH.D level)

Course Load

Course Load - is the total number of credit hours a student is enrolled in at census of a given term.

Doctoral Practice

Doctoral Practice – Professional doctoral degrees including the following: JD/MBA, JD/MHA, JD/MLS, Law JD, Physical Therapy DPT, Dental Surgery DDS, MD/MBA, MD/MPH, MD/Ph.D. Combination, Medicine MD, and Nursing DNP

Doctoral Research

Doctoral Research – Ph.D. degrees not included in the doctoral practice categories

Duplicated Headcount

Duplicated headcount – a duplicated headcount may include the count the same student more than once under certain circumstances. If a report includes both the Indianapolis and Columbus campuses and a student is enrolled on both campuses simultaneously, a duplicated headcount would count the student once on each campus. Additionally, if a student is admitted in more than one school on the same campus, a duplicated headcount would count the student once per school they are admitted to.

Ethnicity

Ethnicity – Prior to fall 2010, students self-reported their ethnicity as White, Black/African American, Hispanic/Latino, Asian, American Indian/Alaska Native, NR-Alien, Native Hawaiian/Pacific Islander, No Answer, Other American, or not specified. Students were asked all options in one question and chose one answer. Native Hawaiian and Asian were reported together. Students with a Visa type other than I-9, NLR, LPR, ASY, PIP, or REF were coded as NR-Alien. Beginning in spring 2010, students were first coded as NR-Alien if appropriate. Students were then asked if they were Hispanic or Latino, and if so were coded as such. Students were then asked if their race was: American Indian or Alaskan Native, Asian, Black or African American, Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander, or White. Students could choose as many as applied. If a student was a US citizen and did not choose Hispanic or Latino, if they chose only one race, that race was recorded as their ethnicity. If they chose more than one race, their ethnicity was recorded as Two or More Races. Please see

First Generation

First Generation - Yes indicates that neither the students' mother or father attended college. Available the IU undergraduate admission e-application and the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The FAFSA asks students to indicate the highest educational level completed by their father and mother. The IU admission e-application asks applicants to indicate if their parent(s) have attended college, and if so, what was the highest degree level they completed. See

Fiscal year (FY)

Fiscal year (FY) – a fiscal year runs from July 1 to June 30 of the following year.

FTE (Full-time Equivalent)

FTE (Full-time Equivalent) – For undergraduate and professional students, the sum of all undergraduate and professional credit hours divided by 15. FYU

FYU – First year undergraduate student

Full-time Course Load

Full-time Course Load – Indicates that at an undergraduate or doctoral practice student is enrolled in at least 12 credit hours at census of the indicated term. A graduate or doctoral research student is enrolled in at least 9 credit hours at census of the indicated term.

Graduated

Graduated - A student has graduated if they have received a degree for a given career by census of the indicated term at any IU campus.

Headcount

Headcount – is the official enrollment at census of the indicated semester. If both the Columbus campus and the Indianapolis campus are selected in the same report, an unduplicated headcount would only count a student one time, even if the student is enrolled at both campuses. In the case that a student is simultaneously enrolled at both the Columbus and the Indianapolis campus, the student is counted at the Columbus campus.

HSS

HSS - High School Student

Induced Course Load – the total number of credit hours generated by a school. In the case of induced course load by student school and level, this is the total credit hours of all students certified into a given school by the department offering the course. In the case of induced course load by school and department, this is all of the credit hours taught by a school by the school of certification of the students taking the courses.

Intercampus Transfer

Intercampus Transfer – Is a student who previously attended a different Indiana University campus than the one indicated in a particular semester at the same academic level.

Intended major – for students who are in University College, a student’s intended major indicates the school and degree the student intends to earn. The student has not been admitted to the appropriate degree-granting unit as of census of the indicated semester but is working towards admission into that school and program.

IPEDS

IPEDS – Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System, which is a system of interrelated surveys conducted annually by the U.S. Department’s National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES). See <http://nces.ed.gov/ipeds/about/>.

Major Plan

Major Plan – A major plan is a student declared course of study indicating the degree they intend to earn.

New to Campus Transfers

New to Campus Transfers – Students who are new to Campus Transfers attended a different IU campus than the one indicated at census of a previous semester

New to IU

New to IU - Students who are new to IU have not attended any Indiana University campus before census of the semester indicated.

New to School

New to School – Students who are new to a school attended the same IU campus in a previous semester but were admitted to a different school than the one indicated at census of the given semester.

Non-Resident

Non-Resident – Non-resident students are students who are either United States residents who are residents in a state other than Indiana or are non-US residents

Part-time Course Load

Part-time Course Load – Indicates that an undergraduate or doctoral practice student is enrolled in less than 12 credit hours. A graduate or doctoral research student is enrolled in less than 9 credit hours at census of the indicated term

Pell Grant Indicator

Pell Grant Indicator – Indicates that the student received any amount of money (at least \$1.00) in a Pell grant funds in their first fall semester. This indicator is only available for fall 2009 and beyond in this dataset.

Resident

Resident – Resident students are students who are residents of the State of Indiana

Residency – resident students are students who are residents of the State of Indiana. Non-resident students are students who are either United States residents who are residents in a state other than Indiana or are non-US residents

Retention

Retention – A student is retained for a given semester if they are enrolled on any IU campus at census (one week after the start of classes) or have received any type of degree for the same career they were previously enrolled in by census of the indicated term from any IU campus.

Returning Undergraduate – is an undergraduate student who previously attended an Indiana University campus, stopped attending, and has been re-admitted at (*the same?*) an Indiana University campus for the indicated semester

RISE

RISE – is a program at the Indianapolis campus indicating students are involved in Research, International/Study Abroad, Service Learning, and/or Experiential Learning.

RISE Experiential Learning - A RISE challenge course component that facilitates the process through which a student develops skills, knowledge and values from direct experiences such as internships and field work. See <http://news.iupui.edu/releases/2014/05/springer-rise-program.shtml> .

RISE International/Study Abroad - A RISE challenge course component through which the student studies abroad, enhancing learning and understanding of complex global issues, developing a conceptual framework that informs the way a student looks at the world, and offering meaningful interactions with

diverse populations and cultures. See <http://news.iupui.edu/releases/2014/05/springer-rise-program.shtml> .

RISE Research

RISE Research – A RISE challenge course component through which Knowledge learned in the classroom is applied to research-based projects that can serve the student’s area of study and creative activities, as well as the campus and the greater community. RISE Service Learning

RISE Service Learning - A RISE challenge course component in which the course combines classroom instruction with meaningful community service that enhances the student’s growth and commitment to civic engagement. See <http://news.iupui.edu/releases/2014/05/springer-rise-program.shtml> .

RTU

RTU – Returning Undergraduate Student (see Returning Student for more information). Applies to Indianapolis campus only.

SAT score

SAT score – indicates a student’s best SAT score or converted ACT score on file with Indiana University. If a student took both tests or a test more than once, the best combination of scores is used, converting ACT scores to the equivalent SAT score and using the highest possible combination of scores on file with Indiana University.

Service Hours

Service Hours – the number of hours a school is providing a service to for a group other than themselves (see report 55)

Statewide Technology

Statewide Technology is a program run by Purdue in West Lafayette. Students enrolled in statewide technology are not part of an IU cohort, rather, they are counted at West Lafayette. If an IU student, however, enrolls the statewide technology program at a later date, we can count them as retained. Student Event

Student Event indicates a program, service or policy that a student participated in. This information is uploaded using term codes in which the “event” occurred and student addresses. Examples may include Fall 2013 Summer Bridge, Spring 2012 Leadership Development Program, Fall 2010 21st Century

Scholars Peer Mentoring

Scholars Peer Mentoring. This field was created to capture information about important student success programs that are not in the Student Information System (SIS).

Student Flow

Student Flow – indicates the movement of a student through different schools, campuses, or programs

Student School

Student School – indicates the school that the student is currently certified in at census of the indicated semester

Transfer Student

Transfer Student – is a student who previously attended a non-IU campus after high school who has transferred credit to IU from that institution in the same academic career.

TRU

TRU – Transfer Undergraduate (see Transfer Student for more information)

UGRD

UGRD - Undergraduate

Unduplicated Headcount

Unduplicated headcount – An unduplicated headcount will count a student once and only once. If a student is enrolled simultaneously on the Indianapolis and Columbus campus, an unduplicated headcount would include the student in the Columbus headcount and omit them from the Indianapolis headcount. Additionally, if a student is admitted to more than one school on the same campus, an unduplicated headcount would count the student in one of the schools.

VSU

VSU – Visiting Student Undergraduate

Winter Term

Winter Term – The winter term at IU runs from the beginning of December until the beginning of March. This term is used in the Kelly Direct and the Social Work Direct programs as part of their four-term calendar.
