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How have IUPUI's alumni engaged with their community? A report on community involvement from the IUPUI Undergraduate and Graduate Alumni Surveys

Introduction

The IUPUI Alumni Survey began in 1992, and revised undergraduate and graduate versions were administered in 2011. Alumni who received an Associate's or Bachelor's degree from any Indiana University or Purdue University school located on the IUPUI or IUPUC campus (N = 4,867) received an e-mail invitation to participate in the undergraduate survey, and 511 completed the survey for a response rate of 10.5%. For the graduate survey, 401 of the 2,735 alumni who received a Masters, Doctoral-Research, or Doctoral-Practice degree from any Indiana University or Purdue University school located on the IUPUI or IUPUC campus completed the survey for a response rate of 14.7%.

Among the major revisions for both surveys were the addition of several items designed to elicit information about (1) participation in and satisfaction with community involvement opportunities while enrolled at IUPUI, (2) current engagement with their community, and (3) the impact an IUPUI education had on alumni desire to become involved in their community. These items were designed jointly by the Office of Information Management and Institutional Research and the Center for Service and Learning. The following Research Brief provides a summary of undergraduate and graduate responses to these items. The results provide information about how alumni engaged in community service activities while enrolled at IUPUI, as well as if they continue to be involved after graduation.

Section 1: Service Learning at IUPUI

At least eight out of ten respondents at each degree level indicated being satisfied or very satisfied with opportunities to engage in community service at IUPUI. Almost 89% of respondents with a Doctorate indicated that they were very satisfied or satisfied, which was greater than the percentages for any other degree levels (Table 1). Forty-nine percent of respondents who received a Bachelor's degree indicated that they had done community service or volunteer work as part of a course, and 31% had done community service or volunteer work through IUPUI, but outside of course requirements or organized service activities (Table 2).

Section 2: Current Community Service Activities

At least two out of ten Associates, Master’s, or Doctorate respondents indicated they were very active in their communities (Table 3). Slightly less than 20% of Bachelor’s degree recipients said they were very active in their communities.

Section 3: Impact of IUPUI

Twenty-six percent of the Bachelor’s respondents indicated that their educational activities contributed quite a bit or very much to their current involvement in political, social, or community issues (Table 4). More than 27% of the Master’s degree recipients who responded to the survey reported their educational experiences contributed quite a bit or very much to their current involvement in political, social or community issues.

More than 70% of the respondents who received a Bachelor’s degree reported that they were very effective in working with people of different races, ethnicities, and religions. More than 68% said they were very effective in developing a personal sense of values and ethics (Table 5).

More than 39% of respondents at each degree level indicated they were very effective at using the knowledge they gained in college to address social issues or problems, and at least 42% of respondents at all degree levels indicated that they were very effective at understanding contemporary social issues (Table 6).
